## 2024 Presidential Election: Rematch!

- General considerations
- Unusual match up: Incumbent vs. former Incumbent (both well known)
- Unlikely to be a lot of preference change
- Small shifts in places like WI can have important effects in the election outcome due to Electoral College
- Campaign activities typically have tiny effects but can matter in close states


## Likely Issues

- Economy: Unemployment rate, inflation, etc.
- Immigration
- Abortion
- Israel-Gaza War
- Russia-Ukraine War
- Future of American democracy/election integrity
- Candidate age
- $86 \%$ of Americans think Biden is too old; $62 \%$ think Trump is too old
- Candidates should emphasize the issues where they are advantaged and downplay those where they are disadvantaged


## A Few Other Ideas

- This far out from Election Day, polls are not very predictive of the eventual outcome
- Although we are already getting attention from the candidates, there is a lot more campaigning to come
- For example, last month Biden announced 44 campaign offices opening in Wisconsin
- Can make a difference in battlegrounds like Wisconsin, Michigan, and Pennsylvania


## U.S. Senate Election in Wisconsin

- Tammy Baldwin (i) vs. Eric Hovde
- Will be one of the most competitive and expensive Senate races


## Some considerations:

- Name recognition (~85\% haven't heard enough about Hovde to have an opinion)
- Baldwin emphasizes issues that connect with urban and rural Wisconsinites, (e.g., supporting agriculture, infrastructure, and keeping jobs in America).
- Hovde connected to Trump but also emphasizing compromise on issues like abortion
- Hovde well resourced


## Closer to Home (8 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Congressional District)

- Congressman Gallagher leaving Congress in two days
- Open seat
- At least 3 Republicans have announced (one endorsed by Trump), 1 Democrat
- Contentious primaries tend to produce nominees who do less well in the general election
- 8th district has definite Republican lean, but don't count Democrats completely out (esp. with the right set of conditions).


## State Legislature

- New Assembly and Senate Districts passed by Legislature and signed by Governor
- Some retirements, people moving to new districts, etc.
- Overall picture: In the Assembly, 49 seats lean Republican and 50 lean Democratic. In the state Senate, 16 seats lean Republican and 17 lean Democratic.
- Of course, candidates, campaigns, issues conditions, etc. matter!
- Likely GOP majority (esp. in Senate) but probably not as large as right now
